How a debate works???

- 1. Opening Statements (1 minute)
 - Like an introduction to a formal paper, introduce yourself/team and the topic you will be debating.
 - Tell what you are going to argue during the debate (like a thesis statement) and tell why your position should win.
- 2. Oral Arguments (2-3 minutes)
 - Like the body of a formal paper, present the evidence that proves your position is correct.
 - This argument should be very factual and persuasive.
 - Opinions not backed by facts could be used to show the weakness of your case, so be careful!
- 3. Rebuttal Arguments (1 minute)
 - Present counter evidence that shows: false, inaccurate, misrepresented, or weak points in the opposition's argument.
- 4. Cross Examinations (1 minute)
 - As each team finishes its rebuttal, the other team has time to ask questions about the evidence presented in order to prove the invalidity of the argument.
- 5. Closing Arguments (1 minute)
 - Like the closing paragraph of a formal paper, summarize the key points you presented AND focus on weak arguments presented by the opposition.
 - Conclude with a persuasive argument that will win the debate for you even if you are losing based on facts!

Other rules:

- It is not acceptable to interrupt the other side while they are speaking
- Take notes on what they say so you can respond when it is your turn.
- It is not acceptable to refer to the other group using mean or disrespectful names, it will make your group look desperate
